Peter Symonds College places significant emphasis and priority on supporting students with their next steps, whatever direction they want to take. All students at the college are on a careers learning journey, moving towards decisions at key transition points and developing lifelong career development skills and knowledge. Our careers provision and programme has been designed to support all students on this journey while at college and beyond, and is responsive to need, with multiple encounters and experiences across each academic year. This helps all students develop their career readiness, essential skills for the workplace, while also enabling them to make well-informed decisions about education, training, apprenticeships, and employment opportunities.

The college is fully committed to and aware of the DfE publications linked to careers and the Gatsby Benchmarks, structuring our Careers Programme to meet statutory requirements and CDI Careers Development Framework. We are proud to have held the Quality in Careers Standard since 2008, fully meeting all the requirements in our most recent assessment in 2022 and will be working towards reassessment in 2025. We are affiliated members of the CDI professional body and all Careers Advisers adhere to the CDI codes of practice. Continuing professional development linked to careers education is a priority for all staff, especially the careers team.

The College offers: -

- A large dedicated Careers Department with resources and study space, staffed by the Careers Team and open throughout the college day
- Access to digital careers resources, which include the Unifrog platform, along with a comprehensive Intranet site for students, parents, and staff to access
- Unlimited access to impartial and unbiased one-to-one appointments with a qualified Careers
 Adviser throughout students' studies in college, with different types of appointments
 available and all bookable online or in person
- Targeted support to students in the following identified groups EHCP; vulnerable; FCM; EAL
 or refugee; young carer; NCOP; armed forces child or looked after child
- self-employed staff, higher education providers, educational establishments and organisations through cross-college careers events with external visitors/stakeholders:
 - Careers Day compulsory off-timetabled day in the spring term for all students, with approximately 150 talks delivered by external speakers
 - Progression Fair spring term exhibition with approximately 85 stands, allowing students to explore higher education, employment, training providers, and gap opportunities with visiting representatives from these areas
 - Symonds Lecture Programme compulsory 50-minute timetabled sessions for Lower Sixth students in the spring term, which cover careers sessions delivered by external speakers, focusing on progression

Opportunities for students to access meaningful encounters with a variety of employers, employees,

- Lunch time careers talks organise approximately 35 talks during the academic year with visiting representatives, covering employability skills, higher education, apprenticeships, and employment opportunities
- Careers Education takes up a high proportion of the 40-minute tutorial programme delivered by tutors, which is compulsory for all students to attend weekly
- One-to-one reviews with a personal tutor to monitor progress and support progression
- Up-to-date job vacancy system, allowing students to view current and local labour market information and apply for suitable opportunities (including apprenticeships, part-time jobs, volunteering, and work experience), along with registering to get alerts when new relevant opportunities become available
- Relevant career opportunities are advertised to all students through a weekly Careers Bulletin and the Careers Google Classroom, along with regular emails advertising college careers events and support available
- Termly Careers Newsletter advertising key and relevant information, with a targeted newsletter for parents and a separate one for students and staff
- Students studying vocational courses, which take up the majority of their studies will participate in compulsory work experience

Student Careers Ambassadors play an essential role in our college, and student voice is a key part of our Careers Strategy. Any student can apply to become a Careers Ambassador, where responsibilities include attending termly meetings to help review and evaluate the Careers Programme; contribute to newsletters & social media presence; consult & assist in the creation of posters & displays; and meet & greet visitors at events. Over the last year, we have had five actively engaged Careers Ambassadors.

Below is a detailed overview of the careers provision provided to students, depending on whether they are a Level 2, Lower Sixth, or Upper Sixth student. Our Careers Programme is underpinned by progressive learning outcomes, tailored to the needs of learners, and is linked to the college's development plan. The programme is mapped against the Gatsby Benchmarks, with an aim to expose students to the career routes, opportunities, and possibilities available; allowing them to identify & develop their skills, qualities, and goals, to make informed and ambitious decisions about their next steps after college.

Access to Personal Guidance

Personal guidance refers to purposeful and supportive conversations between a Careers Adviser and a student. The college provides all students with access to high-quality, impartial careers guidance through its in-house team of professionally qualified Careers Advisers. All advisers hold a Level 7 careers guidance qualification, adhere to the CDI Code of Ethics, and undertake regular professional development to ensure up-to-date and informed support. Students are made fully aware of how to access personal guidance, with regular reminders shared during tutorials and through the Symonds Lecture Programme. This information is also communicated to parents and carers via newsletters and parents' evening events. The Careers Department is based in the Ashurst Building and is easily accessible to all students. The location is well-advertised, and Careers Assistants are always available at the reception desk to the department to help students book appointments, as well as to provide general information and support.

Parent Engagement

The college has a clear approach to engaging parents and carers in our Careers Programme, with a focus not just on sharing information, but also supporting parents and carers to make the best use of it and get involved in events we organise. This includes:-

- Termly parents/carers Careers Newsletter
- Appointments available with a Careers Adviser at every Parents' Evening
- Regular emails sent with key information
- Future Options Information evening specifically for parents, with a recorded presentation delivered by Careers Adviser & visiting university, along with a mini fair of visiting exhibitors
- Apprenticeship Information evening specifically for parents, with a recorded presentation delivered by Careers Adviser & visiting employer, along with a mini fair of visiting exhibitors
- Higher Education Funding evening specifically for parents
- EHCP Information Evening for parents and students, with information talks and a mini fair of visiting exhibitors
- Careers Information added to the Parent Portal for all parents to access, along with recordings from any careers events

Careers in the Curriculum

In addition to the Careers Programme, careers is also delivered through curriculum areas, with subject teachers highlighting progression routes for their subject and the relevance of the knowledge and skills developed in their subject for a wide range of career pathways and future career paths. This can be delivered via lessons, lunchtime talks or workshops, visits to employers, visiting speakers to the college, and college trips. These activities are recorded and evaluated through Unifrog.

Quality Assurance

We are committed to quality assurance and continuous improvement of our Careers Programme. Each term we complete the Careers and Enterprise Company Compass evaluation, which measures our careers provision against the Gatsby Benchmarks. The college consistently achieves 100% across all of the Gatsby Benchmarks. This academic year, we will complete the new Careers Impact Internal Leadership Review via Compass and participate in the Careers and Enterprise Company Peer-to-Peer Review. This will allow us to share practice and progression against the Gatsby Benchmarks, along with identifying what works well and areas for improvement.

The Careers Programme is regularly evaluated using feedback from students, parents/carers, staff and external stakeholders, to ensure it has impact, and is achieved through: -

- Questionnaires and surveys completed after every careers activity
- Annual careers survey
- Evaluation of destination data
- Tracking and data gathered through student use of Unifrog
- Careers Ambassador input
- 1-1 discussions with students
- Feedback from staff and students through tutorial evaluation
- Measure all activities against CDI framework and Gatsby Benchmarks
